## SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

On Thursday, April 19 at 8 PM, a Special Town Meeting will be held to vote on an appropriation of \$8000 to cover additional finishing work on Sawyer Hall not covered in the original specifications. Of this amount, \$5000 is to be transferred from Revenue Sharing and \$3000 is to be raised by taxation.

Another article will call for \$7500 from Revenue Sharing to be used for the purchase of a wood chipper machine.

## SAWYER HALL UPDATE

Work on Sawyer Hall is progressing and should be completed soon, according to the Selectmen. Structural renovations are being handled by Whiteman Bros. of Colrain. A new plumbing and heating system has been installed by Don Ward of Buckland, and the building has been rewired by Charles York of Shelburne.

Some unexpected problems were encountered early in the renovation. Poor quality foundation work had to be corrected before upstairs remodeling could begin. Some crumbling basement walls and an ill fitting boiler room door were repaired, and a plastic drainage pipe was replaced by a cast iron one as required by the building code.

Upstairs the contractors found more problems as they began the remodeling work. A steel I-beam has to be installed in the back wall of the library to replace a wooden one which has sagged. Shelving in the old kitchenette was found to be supporting the floor upstairs and a new beam will be installed there also. A small leak in the roof was also repaired.

The "new" Sawyer Hall will be quite a change from the old building. Insulation has been blown into the walls. A baseboard heating system has replaced the old furnace and space heaters. Windows have been repaired. A wheel chair ramp and new entryway have been created.

Inside, the building will be brighter and more open. The first floor will provide a foyer with a public phone, the Selectmen's office, a combined Assessors'/Town Clerk's office, new rest rooms, a small storage closet, and the enlarged library. On the second floor, there will be two finished rooms and a large unfinished hall. One of the finished rooms has been designated as a library research center. The function of the other two rooms will be decided by future town needs.

## PLANNING BOARD MEETING

The Planning Board will conduct a public meeting on Thursday, April 12 at 8 PM at the Community Hall, to discuss several proposed changes in the Town Bylaws.

Currently, the Planning Board is also working on developing a 5-year plan to increase the tax base of the Town. More on this in the next issue.

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## TAXPAYERS TURNOUT IN HEATH

A whopping 30% increase in taxes this year has finally stirred the people of Heath to action!

One new resident was so incensed that he wrote to the Selectmen requesting an explanation. The result was that they called a special meeting on Tuesday, March 6, to answer questions and to provide general information on the status of Heath's finances. The Board of Assessors and the Finance Committee were all there with the Selectmen armed with charts, ledgers, and reports.

It was one of the best attended special meetings ever held in Heath. An estimated 50-60 persons turned out despite torrential rains and ankle-deep mud to air their concerns. The meeting was moderated by First Selectman Ken Cole who handled the sensitive subject matter and restive crowd deftly.

Thirty questions and answers had been prepared in advance and a lot of valuable information came out about where Heath's money goes. Many felt that the State is the real villain and that home rule is practically dead in Massachusetts.

The Assessors prepared an analysis of the trend of the Town's finances over the past four years. Richards Steinbock translated this information into a chart which we have reproduced on a separate page. It shows that our Town expenditures have increased markedly and our share of State Air has not kept up.

## TAX BILL QUESTIONS?

The Board of Assessors meets Friday evenings at 8 PM at the Community Hall. Anyone with questions concerning their tax bill may attend a meeting or telephone the Hall at 337-4934.

The Assessors have met recently with a representative of a computer service company to investigate the advantages of having the tax records and bills handled on a computer. Several surrounding towns employ a computer service and the Assessors have discussed the system with officials in Buckland and Colrain. It is expected that a computer service would pay for itself in issuing tax bills more promptly and in reducing clerical work.

Grange members catered several dinners last fall in order to replenish their treasury. In the last several months attendance at regular meetings has been so poor that no business could be conducted due to the lack of a quorum. 

## LIBRARY NOTES

The Heath Library sent a delegation to a hearing in Boston on March 14 and to Adams on March 22 relative to a proposed bill changing the formula for allocation of State Grant in Aid to Public Libraries. This will not directly affect the Heath Library, but will increase the Aid to Regional Libraries (Bookmobile), thus indirectly benefitting us. Heath's share of this grant is \$1000 a year. It supplements the annual Town appropriation and is administered by the Library Trustees.
