The process of replacing Phil O'Reilly as Principal of Heath Elementary School has begun. Our district's Superintendent, Alan Genovese, came to the Heath School Community Partnership meeting on Monday evening, June 7, to discuss the position, the selection process, and the timeline.

Mr. Genovese expressed that one of his most important roles as Superintendent is the hiring of principals; and that making a good match for Heath Elementary is his primary goal. He acknowledged that the school is off to a great start after these first three years. He would like to find a principal with the ability to move the school forward along the path already established.

TOWN NURSE PROGRAM LAUDED

The old adage, "a picture is worth a thousand words", appeared to be the case as the Heath Board of Health (BOH) received honors and a \$1,000 award, from the Massachusetts Association of Health Boards, for the town's Public Health Nurse Program and a poster created by the town BOH. Dawn Peters, chairperson of the Board of Health, and Joanne Fortune, Heath's Town Nurse, were in attendance at the March 11, 1999 Fourth Annual Board of Health Recognition Day held in the Great Hall of the State House. Among those present were Lieutenant Governor Jane Swift, and Howard Koh of the Department of Public Health.

The Regional Poster contest award was based on being able to describe what the local BOH felt was "an innovative program that we felt improved the quality of health care within our town..." Within the confines of the one "poster", which in actuality is a small three-paneled kiosk loaded with information and graphics, the BOH was able to outline the program's evolution within town, and to define why this town's program is unique. Reasons described by Susan Gruen of the BOH include: the town's isolated nature, its small size, and limited funding. Ms. Gruen also noted that she hopes, with the poster, to convince other towns of the importance of having a Town Nurse. The poster will be exhibited in the Heath Free Public Library before making its way to the Heath Fair for exhibition in the Exhibit Hall.

According to Ms. Gruen, the award money will be "earmarked" for additional hours for the Town Nurse.

The Board of Health has also received \$750 in grant money from Kaiser Permanente, which will be used for equipment for the Town Nurse.

HEATH SCHOOL WANTS YOU!!!

The Heath Elementary school invites interested parents or community members to join the School Council. The Education Reform Act of 1993 calls for the formation of school councils in each school building in Massachusetts. The Heath Elementary School council will be reforming during the month of September, as the first meeting must occur no later than 40 days after the first day of school. The School council allows individuals to take responsibilities on this council which constitute major opportunities to impact the quality of education and the work environment at the The Heath Elementary School. There will be one three year term of office for a parent position. The community positions are not term related. The principal, with full council approval, will appoint these people.

Council members are given the ability to work as a productive group of school community members charged with: adopting educational goals for the school that are consistent with local district and statewide performance standards; identifying the educational needs of students attending the school; reviewing the school's annual budget; and, formulating a school improvement plan.

It is likely that the Heath Elementary School Council will meet once monthly for no more than ninety minutes per meeting. A schedule will be developed later in the fall based on the availability of the members of the Council.

While he is advertising the position as a full-time principal, he indicated that it would be a bonus to the district if we were able to find someone who has an additional skill or expertise that could also benefit the district. Shared examples of such a skill might include a proficiency in a foreign language, technology expertise, or special needs experience. Participants at the meeting expressed concern about the new principal having duties beyond the school as it may detract from giving 100% to the Heath School. It was also noted that this dual role is not required of other district principals at this time. Mr. Genovese recognized that the initial priority and focus of the principal needs to be establishing a relationship with the school community and the broader Heath community.

Other concerns revolved around the timeline and beginning the search process so late in the school year. The timing would not allow the search committee to do crucial sight visits of prospective candidates while their schools were in session. Others expressed that perhaps we would benefit by hiring an interim principal in order to conduct a more thorough and thoughtful search from a broader pool of candidates.

Mr. Genovese indicated that an interim principal would not be his first choice for Heath, and that the process should begin with a comprehensive search to find a qualified candidate. He did not, however, rule out the possibility of an interim position if the initial search doesn't provide a satisfactory candidate. The position has been posted within the district, and the advertisement for a broader search is currently being drafted for publication. Mr. Genovese is also beginning to put a search committee together comprised of teachers, district personnel, parents and community members.

It was very clear from participants at this meeting that Phil O'Reilly has been an exemplary leader at Heath Elementary and that replacing him will be a challenging task.

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SIXTH GRADE TO CHEWONKI

The sixth graders (Upper Central) from Heath Elementary School went on their class trip to the Chewonki Foundation in Wiscasset, Maine on April 12-16. The Chewonki Foundation is an outdoor education center that specializes in environmental education and natural history. Part of the purpose of our trip was to visit and learn about several natural ecosystems to complement a portion of the Mohawk Trail Regional School District science curriculum for sixth grade. Despite cool early April weather, a great time was had by all!

After our arrival at Chewonki on Monday afternoon, the class split into two groups. One group headed off to Hoyt's Point campsite with their Chewonki teacher Greg. The other group went in the opposite direction to Lower Club campsite with Jenn, another Chewonki teacher. Part of our Chewonki experience was camping in 4-person tents and cooking our own meals over campfires each day. Each campsite overlooked the salt marshes and tidal mudflats surrounding Chewonki Neck.

During the week we visited several different ecosystems in and around Chewonki Neck. We explored the Pond and found salamander and frog eggs, a few early season frogs, lots of water boatmen, caddisfly larvae, dragonfly nymphs and other aquatic critters. During our Forest lesson, we visited the porcupine caves and met some of the local mammals of the Maine woods. At the Salt Marsh, several students pulled on hip boots and trudged through the mud and hidden "honey pots" in search of mummychugs. Several students ended up hip deep in mud and had to be "rescued" by their classmates! We spent a day at the Rocky Shore and the beach at Reid State Park, exploring the tide pools. Many starfish, crabs, blue mussels, periwinkles, and sea cucumbers were jubilantly discovered. We had lots of fun chasing waves and having a cookout on the beach as well.

Some of the other fun activities we did while at Chewonki were the Barn Climb and the Wild Goose Chase. The Barn Climb is an indoor ropes course in which we got to climb the walls and beams inside an old barn, wearing our safety harnesses and helmets the whole time. On the Wild Goose Chase, we had to work together as a group to get over and through several obstacles, such as the "Bark Stripper", a tire hung six feet high between two trees.

Everyone had a great time and learned a lot! Chewonki offers a very good outdoor education program with handson learning. We were able to visit and explore ecosystems that we do not usually find here in the hills of Heath.

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
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The Way It Is



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ASSESSORS' REPORT

What's Land Worth in Heath? It's a simple question, and we wish there was a simple answer. When you get your real estate tax bill you'll see an assessed value for land and then values for any buildings listed below the land assessment. You'll also see an amount of acreage listed on the bill. You'd think that you could just divide the assessed land value by the acreage and come up with a per-acre value, but there's more to it than that.

To begin with, all parcels with sufficient road frontage are considered to have a "primary" building lot. What's "sufficient road frontage"? That's been established by the zoning bylaw and for the most part is 250 feet. However, if the parcel was created before the zoning bylaw, you may have less than 250 feet and still have a potential building site — this is called "grandfathering". The building lot is up to two acres of the total land (again, it can be less in a grandfathered parcel).

This primary building lot (house lot) is assessed at \$7,875 per acre if it is not "improved" (i.e. no power, well or septic), and \$12,180 per acre if it is improved (see table below).

"Residual" land (land not considered to be house lots) in Heath, is assessed at \$525 per acre. So, now, all the rest of your land is worth that, right? Wrong. If you have sufficient acreage and sufficient road frontage for more than one house lot, we assess some of the land as "secondary" building lots.

These secondary lots are potential sites for building on your land. Assessors must not only value property at "full and fair market value", as the state Department of Revenue tells us, we must also assess it for "greatest and best use." In other words, that beautiful field out there could hold a few houses on it and must be assessed accordingly. It gives us assessors a different perspective on our natural resources.

Secondary lots are minimally 2 acres and are assessed at \$1,300 per acre. Each secondary lot must have at least 250 feet of road frontage. We limit, however, how many secondary lots a parcel can have based on its overall acreage and road frontage: 1 - 6 acres with 0 "minimum frontage", (this is minimum frontage above and beyond the frontage for the primary house lot), would have 0 "maximum secondary sites"; 6.01 - 15 acres with 250' frontage, 1 secondary site; 15.01 - 35 acres with 500' frontage, 2 secondary sites; 35.01 - 65 acres with 750' frontage, 3 secondary sites; above 65 acres with 1,000' frontage, 4 secondary sites.

Furthermore, your assessment can be changed if you put the land in either the "Chapter 61" (forestry) or "Chapter 61A" (agricultural) program. These are agricul-

tural preservation incentives provided by the state to discourage development of farm land. The two-acre house lot must be excluded from these programs. We'll have an article about these programs in an upcoming issue of the Herald.

Here are our land values at a glance, defined according to Type of Land, Acreage and Assessed Value: Improved house lot, up to 2 acres, \$12,180 per acre (2 acres = \$24,360); Unimproved house lot, up to 2 acres, \$7,785 per acre (2 acres = \$15,750); Secondary (potential) lot, 2 acres each, \$1,300 per acre (\$2,600 per 2 acre lot); Residual land, (all land outside the house lots), \$525 per acre.

Some examples might help:

- For a five-acre parcel with a house on it, the land aloneis worth \$25,935 (\$24,360 for the two-acre house lot and \$1,575 for the three "residual" acres).
- For a 20-acre parcel with 1,000 feet of road frontage and a house on it, the land would be worth \$36,910 (\$24,360 for the two-acre primary house lot, \$5,200 for the two secondary house sites four acres and \$7,350 for the residual 14 acres).
- For a 60-acre parcel with 600 feet of frontage and no buildings on it, the land would be worth \$49,300 (\$15,750 for the unimproved primary house lot, \$5,200 for the two secondary house sites there isn't enough frontage for a third house site despite the acreage, and \$28,350 for the remaining 54 acres).

This shows that the folks who own the five-acre parcel are paying half as much in real estate tax for their land as the folks who own 60 acres! Remember: We are taxing the *use* of the land. To confuse matters even more, if you own land in Mohawk Estates, it is valued from a different schedule. We'll have an article on Mohawk Estates assessments soon.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY

The Friends of the Heath Library were as disappointed as our Librarian and the Library Trustees when we heard that the Heath Library did not receive the building feasibility grant we had applied for. The Friends were poised and ready to do their bit in planning and fundraising. It is no secret that our library is seriously overcrowded and overstressed. Feasibility study funding would have enabled us to gather the very specific information we need to plan our library's future.

However, as Laurie has said, we will just use the extra time to talk with more people and gather what information we can. (And we have learned a lot about grant writing in the process)!!

We are fortunate to live in a town where people generate multiple possible solutions to problems, instead of saying that nothing can be done to improve a given situation. Many people have come up with possible scenarios for enlarging our well-used library.

One suggestion was to move the library to the main floor of the Community Hall. That would certainly give us more wide-open space. The one caveat that immediately comes to mind is a question about the cost to strengthen the floor to hold the weight of the books. There is a special building code standard that libraries are required to meet.

Another suggestion involved the Community Hall, but in a very different way. The town offices also need more space and would be improved by being handicapped-accessible. The suggestion was to build an addition onto the Community Hall which could make use of the hall's handicapped accessibility, the handicapped-accessible bathroom and the new heating system. The newly installed lift would make both levels handicapped-accessible. The town offices, the police department and the post office could use the hall addition and the library could expand into space currently occupied by the post office and police department.

When the school was being planned, there was a brief discussion about combining the town library with the new school library. Obviously that did not happen, but the layout and construction of the school library is such that the town library could feasibly be added on.

The final suggestion, until some creative soul comes up with yet another idea, is to build a whole new library in the Center. Of course, it must be decided exactly how we define "the Center". Does it extend up Bray Road and down to the Dickinson Farm?

There are pros and cons to each of these suggestions ranging from our own aesthetic and community concerns to state requirements. We will talk about them in more detail in coming additions of the Heath Herald. In the meantime, the Friends will continue to raise funds to meet the ongoing needs

of the Library, and put some money away towards the day the Library begins to enter a new era of its history.

We'll be seeing you at the Library - and at the Book Sale at the Heath Fair. Don't forget to weed your bookshelves before August. We are starting to collect books at the Fairgrounds and continue to look for more contributions.


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MILESTONES
